

'Miracle worker' visits the Cape this weekend

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ORLEANS — Dr. Regina Kruczynska looked at my narrow notebook and shook her head. That won't do, she said, as she grabbed larger sheets of white-lined paper and pushed them across the table.

"This is big," she emphasized, aiming a curt nod at my pen signaling I could now begin writing.

"This is very important for entire Cape," Kruczynska said, traces of her youth in Poland still discernible after more than 40 years in the states.

On Tuesday, Kruczynska was sitting in her kitchen singularly focused on a visitor slated to arrive at the end of this week: Mahendra Kumar Trivedi, whose extensive biography says his miracles, which include increasing crop yields by 500 percent, have been verified by science.

"I have a great plan for him," Kruczynska said, explaining she wants him to bless the shore to forestall erosion, the woods to rid ticks of Lyme disease, and farms and gardens to increase local harvests.

Kruczynska is a recent follower of alternative medicine although she was guided by her intuition more than lab tests throughout her 40-year

career in medicine, which included stints at Mt. Sinai and Mercy hospitals as well as 20 years in private practice.

A few years ago she became frustrated with the medical establishment.

"There are hundreds of ways to help people without chemicals," she said.

That frustration led to depression until her office manager suggested she read Deepak Chopra, considered the father of the holistic healing movement.

"When she started talking to me I thought she was crazy," Kruczynska admitted.

But as she delved deeper into the subject she found her own spiritual path that, last February, led to Trivedi, who is

revered for his healing powers and "divine energy."

"His energy has the power to change the atom," she said.

Supporters say Trivedi, who was born in India, has significantly improved the health of those with cancer, chronic pain, depression and arthritis, among other conditions. When he arrives on Cape he has agreed to help those with chronic Lyme disease for no charge.

"He blesses those cells; they become innocent. They don't cause any more problems," she said.

People across the globe respect the Trivedi Effect, which is trademarked, and they go to see or hear Trivedi (who does conference calls) to fix whatever problems they have in life: financial, emotional, health.

Kruczynska went to a conference in Chicago to see Trivedi this spring after she lost her husband.

"The energy was so beautiful," she said. "Even though I lost my husband I thought, I can survive. I can work. It was like a miracle."

When she met Trivedi she found herself asking: "How would you like to come to the Cape and bless our land ... bless our shores? He said, 'I'm coming.'"
